Award Winning Park!

St. James Park has won the 'Southampton Open Spaces Award 2006' from the 'City of Southampton Society' and 'Southampton Commons & Parks Protection Society'.

The 'Southern Daily Echo' invited nominations from the public, parks were short listed, visited by the judging panel, and ours was chosen as "the best community park in the city".

The Mayor of Southampton will unveil a plaque commemorating this award on Thursday, 7th September at 11.00 am – All Welcome!

Reminiscence's of The Park

On the 27th May, The FoSJP supported by Southampton Archive, invited members of the community to share their memories and historical knowledge of St. James' Park.

A steady flow of people provided a wealth of information, and the diversity of the accounts "brought the history of the park to life", said Johnny Carrington, co-ordinator of the event.

The park began life in the mid 1800's as a nursery and then became a gravel pit. In 1882 there were plans to build a railway station on the site but they never came to anything. In 1911 the city council opened 'Shirley Recreation Ground'. Tennis courts followed and during the second world war, the 'Rec' (as it became known), was home to barrage balloons and a bomb proof structure which was built to house the local ARP wardens, this building later became the park wardens' canteen and public toilets. It's now been partly converted into a kiosk!

Particular thanks must go to local historian **Bob Grice**, who has generously donated his long researched and well documented account of the 'Local History of Shirley'. Bobs extensive work will help us with future projects and is a great example of preserving our heritage for future generations to learn about us and our past.

All the material collected will be made available in the future, but we are still after your memories and pictures, in particular it's known that a postcard of the original opening of the 'Rec' exists.

Kiosk and Toilets Now Open

You may remember in the last newsletter under the heading of 'The Next Steps' that one of our goals was to open a small scale café with toilet access by the summer holidays.

On Wednesday 9th August that vision became a reality. A great deal of hard work has been put in by members, other volunteers, Southampton City Council, and even some passers by. The old toilet block has been transformed (partly) into a kiosk selling drinks, snacks, and ice creams. Fair-traded goods are being sold wherever possible and prices are being kept at an affordable level. All profit is going straight back into the development of the kiosk and the park.

Seventeen volunteers are helping to run the kiosk, initially between 1.30 pm and 4.00 pm on Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays with the aim of opening longer hours and on more days as soon as possible.

With the opening of the kiosk, the council have opened a toilet everyday from 8.00 am to 4pm and on Sundays when the kiosk is open. The FoSJP have a responsibility for cleaning on Sundays, the council contract a cleaner for the rest of the week. No more crossed legs and dashing home!





Survey Results

Thank you to everyone who responded to our questionnaire back at the FoSJP launch in May. From a sample of 394 responses, we have been given a broad overview of your priorities for St. James Park (all the results have been collated and interpreted for us by the council – thank you).

You may remember that the questionnaire asked; if you were given 30 tokens, how would you spend them to improve St. James' Park? The graph below represents your 'token spending' and by far the most popular priority was to renovate the existing building followed by new play equipment.

We are asking for a commitment of a few hours a month and each sub-committee would include a member of The FoSJP main committee. It's a great way of meeting people and making a real difference in our community. We need your help; the nine of us on the committee can't do it on our own.
